8. Teaching

8.1 Courses taught at University at Buffalo:

ARC607/END593LAB – Urban Design options studio (fall 2022) – Interdisciplinary architecture and real estate studio focused on design and development proposals for the Central Terminal former post office, Railway Express Agency and surrounding grounds. Five mixed teams of architecture and real estate development students analyzed, conceptualized, designed, and calculated proposals in a competition format. Work has featured in two local news outlets, and student evaluations were strongly positive.

END498 – Research Projects (fall 2022) – Research methods course focused on studying the relationship between buildings and public space in the Elmwood Village neighborhood. Student projects included measuring communicative elements in front yards and correlational studies of public life and sense of place. Student research data will now be used to write a peer-reviewed journal article on front yard inhabitation and communication, under consideration for a Brill Award.

ARC606 – Urban Design research studio (spring 2022) – Community-engaged urban design and landscape architecture studio, co-taught by Conrad Kickert and leading landscape architect Joy Kuebler. Three phases analyzed, envisioned, and designed a new Commons green space in collaboration with local residents. Work has been sponsored, championed by residents, and featured in various local news outlets.

ARC630/URP594 – Urban Design intellectual domain seminar (spring 2021, spring 2022) – Seminar focused on the concept and sense of place, as well as placemaking as an act of co-creation and rooting. Combination of theories, analysis methods, and an applied placemaking exercise in Buffalo. Student work included historical analyses, public space and public life metrics, and design work. The 2022 edition collaborated with the Elmwood Village Association.

ARC607/URP581-582 – Urban Design options studio (fall 2021) – Interdisciplinary architecture and planning studio focused on creating new connections between anchors in the disinvested Broadway-Fillmore neighborhood in Buffalo's East Side. Studio collaborated with neighborhood partners and residents; outcomes were regularly presented to the public in live and online events. Studio work informed New York State investment program in the neighborhood, for which I serve on an advisory board.

END460 – Environmental Design Workshop 4 (spring 2021) – Research studio focused on analyzing post-retail futures for storefronts in Buffalo's East Side Broadway-Fillmore neighborhood. Students regularly interacted with residents and stakeholders in the neighborhood for feedback on their research and presentation of their outcomes.

ULI Hines competition (spring 2022) – Mentoring an interdisciplinary team of architecture, urban planning and real estate students to design a challenging site in Oakland, CA.

8.2 Courses taught at University of Cincinnati:

PLAN7007/ARCH (Fall 2016,2017,2018, 2019, 2020) – Graduate Plan Making Workshop – Studio course that connects students with real-world clients in sponsored urban design and planning projects (which I acquire myself). Projects have included a downtown plan for Georgetown, KY; a masterplan for Paris, KY and the surrounding county; the future of urban parking for UBER; a corridor-wide plan and transit hub design for the Uptown Corridor in Cincinnati, and a bicycle plan and design for an underserved Cincinnati neighborhood. The 2017 and 2018 projects have won APA awards for best student work.

ARCH7053/PLAN6020/6040 (Fall 2015,2016, 2017, 2018, 2019, 2020) – History of urban form/theory of urban design – Interdisciplinary lecture series and workshop on the history of the built and designed city. After covering three millennia of city history, we focus on theories of urbanism, applying them to analysis of urban neighborhoods. The course enrollment (60-75 students) was the largest in the School of Planning, and evaluations have been very positive. I have co-authored the course pedagogy in a paper with Dr. Robert Fishman in *Urban Design and Planning*. The course has been part of an interdisciplinary collaboration, focusing on the historically African American West End of Cincinnati.

PLAN6021 (Spring 2016, 2017, 2018, 2019, 2020) – Elements of Urban Design – Workshop course that surveys the different forms and elements of the city as a self-emergent complex system, and surveys the different roles of professionals in 'designing' the city. This deliberately broadens perspectives to architects, engineers, developers and preservationists, calling local professionals to share their experiences. Exercises link urban morphology with urban design guidelines.

ARCH7005 (Summer 2019) – Advanced Integration Studio – Taught graduate architecture students a series of workshops on urban design process, precedents and communication. The funded graduate studio project focused on a post-industrial site on the Cincinnati riverfront. Student outcomes have been published in a book by the School of Architecture, for which I wrote the introduction.

PLAN7009 (Spring 2019, 2020) – Graduate capstone workshop – Applied, community engaged workshop in the Cincinnati region. The 2019 workshop focused on the post-industrial community of Lockland, the 2020 workshop focuses on the underinvested neighborhood of Price Hill. Students analyze and make proposals for the community in close communication with local residents through frequent community meetings. Student work awarded with honorable mention in the University Alliance Ruhr's *Future of My City* competition.

ULI Hines Urban Design Competition (Spring 2016, 2017, 2018, 2019, 2020) – Mentoring an interdisciplinary team of architecture, landscape architecture, urban planning and real estate students to design an urban site in a national competition setting. Projects have taken place in Atlanta, Chicago, Toronto and Miami. My team has made it to the ULI Hines finals in 2020.

Studio measured activity and evaluations of high-rise residents through GPS and surveys in the urban core of Rotterdam, yielding a report that informed high-rise policy.
